Pakistani mother saved in a rare life-threatening cesarean scar pregnancy

The condition leads to uterine rupture, massive internal bleeding and maternal death

Ras Al Khaimah: When 34-year-old Pakistani mother of four, Asma Sami-ur-Rehman, arrived at the Emergency Department of RAK Hospital with abdominal pain and vaginal bleeding, she had no idea her life was at risk.

Recognising the urgency, the hospital's multidisciplinary team, led by Dr. Nilesha Chitre, Specialist, Obstetrics and Laparoscopic Gynecology, moved swiftly to save Asma's life.

Because the early symptoms of brain abscesses resemble migraines, flu, or neck pain, many patients dismiss them or rely on over-the-counter painkillers

Brain abscesses are extremely dangerous and can progress quickly," said Dr Tinku Jose Kurisinkal, consultant neurosurgeon at RAK Hospital. "This patient's condition was critical because the infection had advanced rapidly. The challenge is that their symptoms often mimic less severe conditions. Fortunately, our team acted fast and didn't overlook the signs.


Doctors at RAK Hospital Successfully Treat Rare and Life-Threatening Cesarean Scar Ectopic Pregnancy

With C-section deliveries on the rise, experts warn of growing risk of rare and dangerous pregnancies that demand urgent awareness

Asma Sami Ur Rehman, a 34-year-old Pakistani, mother of four arrived at the Emergency Department at RAK Hospital, experiencing abdominal pain and vaginal bleeding. What neither she nor her family expected was the diagnosis of a rare



and potentially life-threatening condition: a cesarean scar ectopic pregnancy. This occurs when a fertilized egg implants within the scar tissue of a previous cesarean section.

Though exceptionally uncommon, this condition is becoming increasingly important to recognize as the rates of cesarean deliveries continue to rise globally and regionally. If left undiagnosed, a cesarean scar ectopic pregnancy can lead to uterine rupture, severe internal bleeding, and even maternal death.


Following the critical diagnosis, the medical team, led by Dr. Nilesha Chitre, Specialist – Obstetrics and laparoscopic Gynecologist at RAK Hospital, swiftly formulated a comprehensive treatment plan. Given the high-risk nature of the case, informed consent was taken for the possibility of massive bleeding and, in the worst-case scenario, hysterectomy (removal of the uterus).




"This was a critical case. The pregnancy was growing in a very fragile area — the cesarean scar. Had it ruptured, the bleeding could have been catastrophic," explained Dr. Nilesha. "Early diagnosis and a tailored surgical approach made all the difference."

To prepare for any emergencies, 7 units of packed red blood cells and 7 units of plasma were reserved. A

multidisciplinary team including vascular, general, and gynecology surgeons stood by ready to assist if complications arose.





laparoscopic- guided vaginal suction evacuation. This hybrid technique, chosen after visualizing the bulging gestational sac beneath an intact peritoneal layer, allowed them to avoid disrupting surrounding tissues and minimize blood loss. "To prevent uterine rupture or injury to the bladder, the evacuation was done under direct laparoscopic vision — a method not widely documented in global guidelines because each case is unique," Dr. Nilesha added.

The patient tolerated the procedure well and required no blood transfusion. She also received a single dose of methotrexate to ensure complete resolution of the pregnancy tissue. Her pregnancy hormone levels dropped to below 5 mIU/mL within three weeks, confirming full recovery.

Cesarean scar pregnancy (CSP) accounts for fewer than 1 in 2,000 pregnancies but carries significant risks. With the rise in cesarean deliveries worldwide, the incidence of CSP is quietly increasing, often without public awareness.

Dr. Nilesha urges women, especially those with a history of C-section, to be vigilant. "Many women are unaware of this condition, and its warning signs can be easily overlooked," she said.

RAK Hospital stresses the importance of recognizing symptoms such as persistent or sharp lower abdominal or pelvic pain, unusual vaginal bleeding or spotting in early pregnancy, dizziness or fainting



(which could indicate internal bleeding), shoulder tip pain (a sign of internal bleeding irritating the diaphragm), and painful urination or bowel movements.

"Any woman with a history of cesarean section should have an early ultrasound to confirm the pregnancy location," Dr. Nilesha advised. "Timely diagnosis is key to preventing serious complications."

The patient has since returned home, grateful for the swift and compassionate care she received. Her experience serves as a powerful reminder: early warning signs matter and the right care at the right time can save lives.

Thanking the doctor and the team, Asma's husband, Sami Ur Rehman said, "I would like to extend my

heartfelt gratitude to Dr. Nilesha from the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at RAK Hospital for performing a successful surgery on my wife, who was diagnosed with a rare and complex condition.
